


# EXPLORING REGENERATION IN BIRMINGHAM


Recently, our Year 10 GCSE Geography students embarked on an insightful field trip to Birmingham city centre to investigate and assess how regeneration has transformed the area.

We visited five key locations — the canal (a non-regenerated area), the Mailbox, Grand Central, the Library of Birmingham, and Brindley Place — carrying out pedestrian counts, land-use surveys, and environmental quality assessments at each site. This hands-on research helped us compare regenerated and non-regenerated areas to see where the biggest changes had taken place.









Our results showed that regeneration has brought lots of positives to Birmingham. The regenerated areas were cleaner, busier, and more vibrant, with a wider range of shops, restaurants, and public spaces complementing the city centre. In contrast, the canal area, which hasn't been regenerated, felt much quieter and less developed.

Overall, it was a fantastic day of fieldwork that really brought our classroom learning to life. We gained a much better understanding of how regeneration can transform a city—and saw first-hand why Birmingham is such a great example of urban change in action!

### What is the TALIT Lesson Observation Project?

### Oxbridge Interview Workshop for Year 12 and 13

The event brought together Year 13 students from five local schools alongside our own Year 12 and 13 Sixth Form students.

### Year 8 Highflyers

During Autumn Term 2 Year 8 high flyers have taken part in two sessions. In session one. students worked collaboratively to prepare for a natural disaster. Utilising their geography lessons students developed their teamwork, problem solving/critical thinking and presentation skills. In session two, students took part in a careers session. The aim was to think about their own career aspirations. They will also look at super-curricular activities that can enhance their interests and strengthen their academic profiles as they prepare for Key Stage 4

### Year 10 Highflyers

The Year 10 Highflyers met in November and began to discuss what UCAS is and how they can use the database to search for universities, courses and apprenticeships. They carried out their own individual searches looking for courses they may never even have thought of, such as an Actuary degree with a gap year in China. We also reinforced the importance of Russell Group universities and Kingsmead as an Oxbridge Hub in an effort to continue to inspire them to reach for the stars!

#### Year 11 Highflyers

Our Year 11 Highflyer students have already had a busy and exciting start to the year. They began with an Informed Choices session, exploring which A Level subjects are essential for different university courses and how to plan ahead for their future studies. Soon after, they welcomed a speaker from Oxford University, who dispelled common myths about applying there and offered a glimpse into student life at one of the world's most prestigious institutions.

























### Stay Healthy, Stay in School: How We Can Reduce the Spread of Illness

As we enter the colder months here at Kingsmead, we are more likely to see a rise in illness within our school community. It is because of this that we look to reducing the possibility of coughs and colds with some simple, proactive measures.

Scientific evidence demonstrates that vaccination, disinfection (cleaning), handwashing, and ventilation can significantly reduce the transmission of infectious diseases.

Schools can play an important role in helping reduce the spread of seasonal illnesses, helping keep pupils and staff healthy, supporting healthy learning environments and regular school attendance.

# **ATTENDANCE**

Professor Russell Viner, Chief Scientific Adviser at Department for Education sets out small actions schools can take across seven areas for maximum impact.

### 1. Parents: Communicate to minimise unnecessary absence

The NHS provides clear guidance on when children are well enough to attend school. Most mild illnesses — such as a runny nose, sore throat, or slight cough — do not require time off school, unless a child has a temperature. Parents know their child best, but schools can support parents to make informed decisions.

### 2. Pupils and staff: Vaccinations for protection

Vaccinations are a key line of defence against flu and other preventable illnesses. When children and young people receive all the recommended vaccines in the national immunisation programme, it helps protect their health and support the wellbeing of the whole school community.

### 3. Pupils and staff: Handwashing is a simple but powerful tool

Hand hygiene is one of the most effective ways to prevent the spread of germs. Wash hands before meals, after using the toilet and after touching animals.

### 4. Pupils and staff: Catch It, Bin It, Kill It approach to respiratory hygiene

Coughs and sneezes spread diseases, but simple everyday habits can help stop infection from spreading. Follow these easy habits:

- Catch it: Use a tissue to cover your nose and mouth when you cough or sneeze. If there's no tissue, cough or sneeze into your elbow, not your hands.
- Bin it: Throw the used tissue straight into a bin.
- Kill it: Wash hands with soap and water after coughing, sneezing, or touching used tissues. Try not to touch your eyes, nose, or mouth with unwashed hands.
- No spitting: it spreads germs.

### 5. Environment: Good ventilation to provide fresh air

Good ventilation can help remove air that contains virus particles and prevent the spread of respiratory infections such as colds, flu and COVID-19. Let fresh air in by opening windows and doors. In colder weather you can open high-level windows instead of low ones to avoid cold draughts or air rooms by opening windows and doors between lessons and at breaktimes.

### 6. Environment: Cleaning to keep a safe and healthy school environment

Regular cleaning helps reduce the spread of germs include regularly cleaning high-touch areas like door handles and desks and toilets, as well as providing tissues and bins in classrooms and liquid soap by handwashing facilities and encourage their use.

#### 7. Behavioural reminders: Small habits, big impact

Children (and staff!) benefit from regular reminders about hygiene and illness prevention. Explain why you are opening the window, even on a chilly day, even just for 10 minutes can make a big difference, and the benefits of bringing fresh air into the classroom and reinforce positive behaviours through classroom routines.

By taking simple, coordinated actions, schools can help reduce illnesses from spreading, promote pupil wellbeing, reduce illness-related absences, and keep pupils learning through the winter months.

#### **Movember at School**

This November, our school proudly took part in Movember, the global campaign raising awareness of men's health issues, including mental health, suicide prevention, prostate cancer, and testicular cancer. Staff members joined in by growing moustaches, while students engaged in themed assemblies and fundraising activities. It was inspiring to see our community come together to support such an important cause. Beyond the fun, Movember gave us a valuable opportunity to talk openly about wellbeing and encourage everyone—students and parents alike—to check in on themselves and those around them. ### Finning trip- Year 10

Our Year 10 students recently enjoyed an inspiring trip to Finning UK in Cannock, where they explored a wide range of career opportunities within the engineering and machinery sector. #### **Indian Stick Insects**

Stick insects are all girls as they clone themselves (babies are a copy of the mom). When the stick insects are scared, they become ridged and fall to the floor like a twig.

#### **Curly Haired Tarantula and Yellow Knee Tarantula**

Tarantulas love to make burrows underground like rabbits. They hunt by detects prey vibrations through their sensitive leg hairs! The hairs on their body are soft and fluffy. They are both calm and friendly.

During Farm enrichment the students have had the opportunity to meet some of the exotic animals on site including Bella the Bearded Dragon and Olive the Hermann Tortoise. The students learned about the animals' habitats, behaviours, facts and simply enjoying the calm and curiosity that the animals bring to the school. Also, the students have had a tour of the Farm animals, where they fed the sheep and pigs. While on their tour they learned about the animals accommodation and their daily requirements.

Farm enrichment helps students learn about all the species we have on Kingsmead Farm, including how to look after them to meet their five welfare needs. Tasks the students can get involved in include creating box enrichment, feeding, grooming and handling different animals, and much more!

Year 10 have been enjoying their practical lessons, including cleaning animal accommodation, completing daily animal husbandry tasks, and learning how to correctly and safely handle the farm and exotic animals. Miss Powell and Mrs. Westbury have enjoyed leading sessions where they have supported students to overcome their fears of snakes and spiders.

Pupils around school love that the animals are built into their daily school life as it sustains positive mental health and wellbeing, as it helps to relax the students and supports them throughout the day.
