LEARNING AND TEACHING

Learning and Teaching update: Empowering students through learning and reflection

At the core of our teaching approach is a commitment to fostering deep learning, critical thinking, and active engagement. We aim to provide students with structured opportunities to reason, justify their thoughts, and reflect on their progress. Through the integration of structured talk, mini whiteboards, and Reflect, Revisit, and Upgrade (RRU) sessions, we create an environment where students are challenged to think deeply and supported to succeed.

Structured Talk: Encouraging Reasoning and Justification

One of the most effective strategies we have been developing in classrooms is structured talk. This involves giving students opportunities to articulate their thinking, discuss complex ideas, and engage in meaningful dialogue with peers. By encouraging students to justify through reasoning and explain their viewpoints, we not only deepen their understanding of content but also help them develop essential communication and critical thinking skills.

Structured talk challenges students to think beyond surface-level answers. In group discussions or paired conversations, students explore different perspectives, reason logically, and refine their ideas through dialogue. This helps them gain confidence in their ability to explain their thought processes and engage with others intellectually.

Mini Whiteboards: Real-Time Assessment and Feedback

A key tool being used in our classrooms are mini whiteboards, used to provide real-time formative assessment. During lessons, students can quickly jot down answers or ideas, allowing teachers to see immediately how well they are grasping a concept. This instant feedback helps teachers adjust instruction on the spot, addressing misconceptions and providing support where needed.

Mini whiteboards also make the classroom more interactive. Instead of relying on just a few students raising their hands, all students can participate simultaneously, ensuring that every voice is engaged.

This low-pressure method encourages students to take risks in their learning, as they know they can make mistakes and learn from them without the fear of formal grading.

The Assessment Cycle and RRU Sessions

After formal assessments, students enter RRU (Reflect, Revisit, Upgrade) sessions to reflect on their performance. These sessions are a powerful part of the learning cycle, as they encourage students to take

ownership of their learning. During the reflection phase, students analyse their results, identifying both strengths and areas for improvement.

The revisit stage involves reviewing challenging material with targeted teacher support. This process solidifies understanding and addresses gaps in knowledge. Finally, the "upgrade" phase gives students the chance to improve their initial work, applying what they've learned to demonstrate growth. The RRU model fosters a growth mindset, focusing on progress and continuous improvement rather than one-time performance.

By combining structured talk, mini whiteboard assessment, and RRU sessions, we are creating a dynamic and responsive learning environment. These strategies not only challenge students to think critically but also ensure they are supported every step of the way. Our approach is designed to empower students to take ownership of their learning, build confidence, and ultimately succeed both in school and beyond. We have been extremely impressed with students' application in all of these areas so far this term.

Shield and Shelter: The strength of our community responsibility at Kingsmead School

Kingsmead School re-introduces the "Shield and Shelter" (SAS) programme, an initiative designed to combat intolerance and promote equality by embedding community responsibility into our school culture. Embracing diversity and inclusion is a shared duty here, ensuring our school remains a safe, welcoming, and respectful environment.

The SAS Team continue to spearhead efforts to eliminate all forms of bullying through proactive engagement. This team, which includes progress leaders, safeguarding officers, and select pupil representatives, is working with school leadership to create a

safer school environment. Rooted in the legal framework provided by the Education and Inspections Act 2006 and the Equality Act 2010, Kingsmead School is committed to maintaining anti-bullying policies to address any form of discrimination and harassment.

Restorative Practice Approach

SAS employs restorative sessions that bring together victims and perpetrators to:

- Foster a secure community for students and staff,
- Mitigate mental health risks by promoting support and inclusion,
- Deter involvement in unhealthy behaviours,
- · Highlight and combat bullying,
- Educate on diversity and reduce discrimination,
- Build a supportive network for pupils navigating difficult experiences.





The '4 R's' for Restoration

Central to our plan are the '4 R's' of restoration:

- Respect: Listening and valuing diverse opinions,
- Responsibility: Acknowledging one's own actions.
- Repair: Developing solutions reparation sessions to prevent recurrence,
- Re-integration: Supporting a structured process for resolving issues, enabling pupils to rejoin their peers positively.

In addressing harm or conflict, students participate in restorative dialogues where they share their perspectives, discuss impacts, and suggest improvements. With mediation support, they receive attentive listening, answers to questions, and practical solutions tailored to mend and build relationships.



Also, the male Guinea pigs' living area has had a glow up, thanks to Mrs Westbury and Miss Powell, who have created a wonderful living space for them.



SUSTAINABILITY A BIG MOVE!

This year, our school has achieved the prestigious Green Flag Award, a testament to our commitment to environmental sustainability and education. The Green Flag Award is an internationally recognised accreditation given to schools that demonstrate exceptional environmental management and educational practices, and earning it requires meeting rigorous standards set by the Eco-Schools programme

The journey towards the Green Flag began with the establishment of our Eco-Committee, a group of students and teachers all involved in the eco club and gardening clubs with Mrs Small and Miss Powell who spearheaded our sustainability efforts. This committee was responsible for conducting an environmental review of the school, identifying areas where improvements could be made, and developing an action plan to address these issues. The review highlighted several key areas: waste reduction, energy efficiency, water conservation, biodiversity, and the promotion of healthy living.

This term, Year 8 community day has cemented our efforts for the Green Flag Award, the school worked together with Brick-works company to allow students to litter pick and create a wild flower bee corridor. Biodiversity was promoted through the creation of a wildlife habitat on the school grounds. Native plants were introduced to attract local wildlife, and bird feeders and insect hotels were installed to provide shelter and food for various species. These efforts created a vibrant outdoor classroom where students could observe and learn about local ecosystems first-hand.

This prestigious award is a reflection of our collective effort and a significant milestone in our journey towards sustainability. It demonstrates our commitment to creating a healthier, greener future for our students and the planet. We will proudly hoist the Green Flag, we are inspired to continue our work and serve as a model for other schools striving for environmental excellence.
